Organisation	Local Authority	Award	Project summary
The Sunnybank Community Centre Association	Aberdeen City	£101,864	This group will use the funding to continue to deliver their classes for the community. These include existing classes for English, sports and hobbies, under 5's and youth activity.
Oban Communities Trust Ltd	Argyll and Bute	£946,000	This group will refurbish and develop the former Rockfield School building in Oban turning it into a community and cultural hub. The centre will incorporate a mix of facilities including; a hot-desking and co-working space, an events and performance space, an arts and heritage space, and an enterprise centre with a bakery and training canteen. The hub will primarily benefit Oban but will also be made available to the Lorn area and the island communities of Tiree, Coll, Mull, Lismore and Kerrera.
Craigmillar Literacy Trust	City of Edinburgh	£138,185	This trust will use the funding to deliver their early literacy support programme in the greater Craigmillar area of Edinburgh, supporting parents and carers in giving children facing challenging circumstances the best start in life. Over the past five years the trust have supported more than 2000 families through their existing programmes, such as Rhymetime, and plan to both continue that support and to build on their success.
Edinburgh Old Town Development Trust	City of Edinburgh	£122,039	This group will create a new community space for residents in the Canongate which will include a space to meet, work, learn and hold events. The project aims to encourage and sustain local participation, build capacity and provide the community with a sustainable services and a base for the group.
Edinburgh Rape Crisis Centre	City of Edinburgh	£499,999	This grant will be used to provide a specialist trauma support service for women and members of the transgender community living in Edinburgh, East Lothian and Midlothian who have experienced sexual violence and abuse. The grant will enable ERCC to increase its staff allowing them to meet the demand for this frontline service and reduce waiting list times from three months to one month. ERCC will also provide long-term support to help the survivors cope with issues such as post-traumatic stress disorder.
East Ayrshire Carers Centre	East Ayrshire	£210,095	This project will enhance and expand the current after school activity this organisation delivers. The grant will enable them to provide additional opportunities for young carers across East Ayrshire and help to close the attainment gap for those from economically disadvantaged backgrounds. Additionally the increased resources will allow a more co-ordinated approach within the school setting allowing them to take a preventative approach rather than engaging with the young carers at a crisis point.

East Ayrshire Council - Safer Communities	East Ayrshire	£373,061	This project will focus on and develop specific activities previously delivered and part-funded by a previous award. It will empower vulnerable families by using play to increase confidence, skills and bonding. The proposal will also provide opportunities for local people to volunteer in delivering community activities.
The Wave Project	East Lothian	£106,000	This group will use the funding to build their surf therapy and peer mentoring project aimed at young people aged between 8 and 24 experiencing depression, anxiety or low mood, or who have experienced trauma caused by stress-related events such as bereavement, family breakdown or domestic violence.
Central Advocacy Partners	Falkirk	£332,285	This group will support people with a learning disability who have experienced or are experiencing domestic/sexual abuse and who have not been able to access appropriate services. Activities will be tailored to address the effects of the abuse with two new posts of advocacy workers supporting/empowering survivors to consider their current circumstances and find alternatives, helping them undertake therapeutic services otherwise closed to them and also to join support groups.
Greener Kirkcaldy	Fife	£916,068	This group will refurbish the local library which was acquired through the Scottish Land Fund programme turning it into a community hub with additional services. The vision is to create a community space that encourages people to grow their own food, prepare nutritional meals, learn new skills, volunteer and take part the community. Through this they hope to tackle food poverty and health inequalities. The community food hub will operate as a social enterprise accessible to everyone in the Kirkcaldy area.
Back Up	Glasgow City	£149,859	This group aims to change the provision of services to those newly injured or just released from hospital with their spinal cord injury. The range of activities will help to reduce the isolation, loneliness, despair and depression that people can often experience on diagnosis, and provide a more responsive service to those who have lived with a spinal injury for some period and have disengaged from family and society.
Free Wheel North	Glasgow City	£120,000	This group will use the funding to grow and develop the Glasgow Green Cycling Centre. The centre will continue to provide all forms of cycling and will now be able to open seven days a week for the first time. They will also continue to engage local people in physical activity and community projects. The centre will be developed to become a community platform not just for cycling but for a range of activities from growing an orchard to a sustainable food café.
The No 1 Befriending Agency	Glasgow City	£103,908	This group will use the grant to continue and to develop their befriending programme for older people. The activity aims to match people over the age of 65 with a befriender helping them to reduce feeling of isolation and loneliness. The organisation will also provide telephone befriending, and social activities such as lunches that allow groups of people to come together and enjoy each other's company.
Rosewell Development Trust Community Company Limited	Midlothian	£106,250	This group will use the funding to secure the long term future of the existing projects they run including their youth employability programme as well as their lunch, youth and computer clubs, and woodland classroom. They will also use the funding to introduce new volunteering and training opportunities for local people to develop new skills, improve their health and wellbeing, and to help improve the community spirit.

Disability Shetland	Shetland Islands	£138,000	This group will deliver a range of group activities, clubs and individual programmes for clients with disabilities and additional support needs throughout the urban, rural and island areas of Shetland. The service is for young people and adults with physical and/or learning disabilities including Cerebral Palsy, Down's Syndrome and Autism.
Carrick Community Leisure Group	South Ayrshire	£800,000	This group will refurbish and upgrade the community owned Speakers Club building in Maybole making it a sustainable centre that will provide opportunities for older people, young people and families. Working with a range of partners CCLG will deliver a diverse range of community and commercial activities to benefit all sections of the community. This one year refurbishment proposal will create office spaces, a café, a number community spaces, a catering kitchen and a gift shop/visitor information space.
The Girvan Town Team	South Ayrshire	£60,000	This group will use the funding to take forward priorities which have been identified by the local community and be able to continue to run their existing range of activities, including 'Creating a Dementia friendly Community' and the 'Development of Men's Shed Initiative'.
Broxburn United Sports Club Trust	West Lothian	£135,000	This group will use the funding to employ a Community Development Officer and Project Co-ordinator to help deliver their sport and wellbeing community programme. They already have wide range of activities on offer but demand has increased. They are also introducing new programmes which will be targeted at older people who are socially isolated, and youth orientated provision where disengaged younger people will be able to develop their confidence, social interaction and leadership skills through sport.
Craigshill Good Neighbour Network	West Lothian	£134,739	This project will work with the older population of Craigshill to provide a programme of week round socialisation activities which will minimise the effects of social isolation and loneliness. Activities will take place in a new, accessible and central location and be delivered primarily by local volunteers. The project will also provide affordable transport and buddy support to the less mobile.
